A- EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Ahmedpur is a town located in the large ranges of Balaghat hills in Marathwada region of Maharashtra. Initially it was under the rule of Nizam Empire of Hyderabad. The town was affected with the tyrannical treatment of Nizams paramilitary. The British left India in 1947. Still, Ahmedpur, being part of Hyderabad State, could see sun of freedom on 17 September 1948.

Ahmedpur is a Teheshil place in Latur district. It is sixty-five kilometers away from district headquarter Latur. It is surrounded by small villages and is deprived from educational, industrial and socio-economical growth. Most of population is depended on farming and it is the only source of their earning and livelihood. Almost land around Ahmedpur is low fertile and non-irrigated hence majority of the population is illiterate and suffering from poverty.

In order to provide education to the farmers, socio-economically poor people and empower them, our visionary founding fathers established Kisan Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, at Udgir in 1964 with the motto “*Bahujan Hitay Bahujan Sukhay*” (Welfare and Betterment of the Masses). Within a short span of time, the Management of K.S.P. Mandal expanded its network of schools and colleges in nearby villages and towns which include 11 schools, 4 Junior colleges, 4 hostels and one more senior college located in different areas.

“Mahatma Phule Mahavidyalaya”, started in 2000 at Ahmedpur is one of its reknowned institutions imparting higher education for the betterment of the masses. It is attached to its sister branches at primary, secondary and +2 level and providing educational opportunities to poor, needy, socially and economically backward students of this area. Mahatma Phule Mahavidyalaya is a single-faculty college with 30151square meter campus area and 2262 square meter built-up area. It is a grant-in-aid college affiliated to S.R.T.M. University, Nanded. The U.G.C. has accorded status of 2(f) to the college. The college has been started with the objectives to provide education to the masses and to make them efficient and self-reliant.

The college has qualified, meritorious and dedicated teaching faculty to maintain educational excellence. Out of 16 regular faculties 08 faculties are Ph.D., 04 faculties are M. Phil. holders, among those 13 faculties have qualified NET/SET.

Our college has been constantly attempting not only to provide a mere formal education or just create graduates but also it has been stressing to inculcate ethical values, values of life, social awareness the feeling of national integration and social consciousness. We consistently try to uplift them to the door of their highest apex of success and satisfaction. The college aims at the versatile development of the students through the ethical, intellectual, physical and cultural values. The college caters the educational needs of the students belonging to the rural area. The college implements various curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities effectively for holistic development of the rural students. The college works for the upliftment of students, their family, society and nation and to contribute universal brotherhood. We are committed to make the rural life qualitative as it was dreamt by our social reformer Mahatma Phule.



CRITERION I

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

The college is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded. The parent university plays a major role in the curriculum design and development as per the UGC guidelines. The college plays an important role in the effective implementation of curriculum. The college plans the supportive implementation strategy and organizes various curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities as per vision, mission, goals and objectives of the institution.

The University conducts workshops for teachers whenever there is upgrade/change in syllabus. Few of our faculties are working in BoS and contributing to frame the syllabus. The teachers are encouraged to attend workshops and seminars in order to keep them well informed of the recent development in their respective subjects. The institution regularly interacts with beneficiaries such as research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum. The faculty members maintain daily teaching diary for effective planning of curriculum. The Career Counseling and Guidance Cell, NSS unit arrange various activities and invite the renowned scholars, guests to inspire and enrich the students. The college also has a centre of YCMO University, Nashik.

The college has adopted feedback system from stakeholders to increase the involvement of stakeholders in curriculum updation and implementation. The faculty members use modern technology for effective implementation of curriculum.

CRITERION-II

TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION

The college ensures publicity and transparency in admission process as per Parent University, the State, Central Govt. and the UGC norms. The college has single faculty of Arts. The college forms admission committee at the beginning of the every academic year. The college publishes prospectus every year. It includes all relevant information regarding the admission procedure, infrastructure, list of qualified staff, fees and scholarships, code of conduct, achievements of the students in academic, sports and other activities. College website, alumni and staff are the base of our publicity of admission process. As per Maharashtra Government policy and parent university norms, students from SC/ST and other backward classes are reserved seats in admissions. Fees exemption and endowment benefits are provided to these students. The college gives equal opportunities for girl students. The current year's statistics of the student profile shows approximately 50% of the applicants are girls.

Teaching plan is prepared according to the academic calendar. The teaching plan is approved by Principal. The Principal confirms the process, if necessary, corrective measures are taken. We follow the evaluation pattern prescribed by the Parent University. Apart from this, the college conducts unit tests assignment, oral test, terminal exams, etc. The teaching-learning process is monitored and evaluated by the Principal.



Internal Quality Assurance Cell is established in the college for the enhancement of quality. The IQAC gives feedback as well as recommendations for the improvements in teaching learning process to Principal. The IQAC guides various departments to plan various activities for the welfare of the students. It monitors overall activities and general academic progress in the college.

The college provides the ICT facilities. Departments organize various programmes and activities of literary and social sciences boards for students' involvement. The co-curricular activities such as seminar, group discussion and debates, etc. are arranged. The guest lectures are organized to provide academic support and guidance to the students. The college has established the career counseling and guidance cell for the professional and career development of the students. The extra-curricular activities such as cultural, sports, N.S.S. and other extension activities are undertaken by the college to develop participatory learning. All the activities are student-centric.

The college sensitizes its staff and students on issues like gender, inclusion, environment etc. and organizes various programmes for the awareness. The college takes the efforts to nurture critical thinking and creativity and in developing scientific temper among the students through providing various opportunities.

CRITERION III

RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

The college takes keen efforts on capacity building in terms of research and imbuing research culture among the staff and students. Research committee is established in the college for the promotion of research. The research committee of the college monitors and addresses the issues of research. Library facility, internet facility, Reading room facility and other facilities are provided to faculty to facilitate research. Many of the faculties of the existing staff have completed their M. Phil. /Ph.D. degree using the resources made available by the college. Out of 16 regular faculties 08 (i.e 50%) faculties are Ph.D. Holders, 04 (i.e 25%) faculties have completed their M. Phil. and 06 faculties are pursuing Ph.D. Three of the total faculties are recognized research guides of the parent university. Adequate opportunities are given to faculty to participate in conferences and seminars and to present papers. Almost all faculty members have presented research papers in national and international conferences. The college encourages its staff and students to make optimal use of the equipment and research facilities of the institution.

The college encourages students and teachers for extension activities. Various measures are taken to promote these activities. Industrial visits and Guest lectures are the strategies we use to establish institute-industry interface.

The staff members are encouraged to participate in various activities related to consultancy services. These are translation, proof-reading consultancies, etc. Consultancy services provided by the faculties are free of cost, as a social obligation, so no revenue is generated. Our faculties are invited by the other institutions those wish to avail their services in their respective areas; the college



provides facility of Duty Leave to them. The services rendered are voluntary and free of cost. Hence, no income generated.

NSS unit is the major mechanism used for extension activities. The institution promotes institutional neighborhood community network. The community oriented activities are organized by NSS units. All the students in college and NSS volunteers of NSS unit actively participate in community oriented activities. NSS special camps are conducted in the adopted village. Activities undertaken by NSS units are – blood donation, free medical check-up camps, Aids awareness, Gram swachhata abhiyan, environmental awareness, tree plantation, and animal disease diagnostic camps, etc in rural areas. Student counseling and personality development activity is organized every year in NSS camp.

The Institution encourages the students to participate in various competitions like debate, elocution, essay writing, etc. organized at different levels. The sports department provides with the necessary facilities to the students to participate in various sport events. The college has an excellent track record of award winning sports-persons.

The College organizes various extension and outreach programmes with other organizations though it does not have formal linkages or collaborations with them. The college is organizing a number of outreach activities, which relate to academic, social, cultural, community service, etc. and all culminating in building a healthy society contributing to nation building and service.

CRITERION IV

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

The Management knows the importance of infrastructure and other facilities to enhance the teaching learning process. The college has a lush green spacious campus in the heart of the town. Major area has been utilized for the playgrounds. Free and adequate parking facility for the student and staff vehicles ensures no parking on the road and better security. The college building comprises of classrooms, store room, staff room, N.S.S. room, sports room, ladies room, etc. The students are provided other facilities like safe drinking water and clean toilets. The noteworthy feature of infrastructural amenities is that our college has a well equipped and spacious library. The Management has provided a well-equipped building sufficient for its present needs. The management is always supportive to provide qualitative higher education to rural masses.

The college has made available all necessary facilities like Seminar hall, cultural activities, reading rooms, digital classroom, canteen, laboratory for Geography department, Subject wise departments, library with reading room, etc. The institute ensures infrastructure facilities to meet the requirement of the differently-abled students.

The College has adequate facilities for indoor and outdoor games. College provides track-suit and Blazers to participants of Ashwamedh/Inter-Uni./All-India- University players.

The Management provides the funds for maintenance, major and minor repairs of furniture, equipments and infrastructure. An effective monitoring system is developed through various



committees ensures the optimal use of budget allocated for the regular maintenance and upkeep of the developed infrastructure, facilities and equipments purchased by the college.

CRITERION V

STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION

The college always supports overall development of students and their progression with various efforts. The college tries to uplift the rural youth with good education in order to make the students responsible citizens of the Country. The college publishes its updated prospectus every year providing all the information about the College and the courses. It includes all relevant information of the college, the admission procedure, infrastructure, list of qualified staff, fees and scholarships, code of conduct, achievements of the students in academic, sports and other activities.

The college is ever ready to boost the performance of the students through scholarships and free ships. The financial aid is available and effectively disbursed in time to time. The college offers every possible help to the students such as Government of India Scholarships, Free ship, Book bank facility, guidance for competitive exams, fee concession and permission to pay in easy installments. The college provides both outdoor and indoor games facilities with spacious play ground and sport equipments and material.

In order to give exposure to students, to other institution, college arranges various educational tours and visits of the students. The various departmental study associations of the college publish wallpapers and provide an opportunity to expose the hidden talents and research aptitude of the students. The cultural department is active in the college. With the help of cultural department, our college provides platform for cultural activities like youth festival, annual -gathering, etc. The college provides TA and DA to the students who participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities.

The college has established the Grievance Redressal Cell, Anti-Ragging Committee for the students support and progression. College has an Alumni Association but it is not registered. The college has an informal mechanism to seek data and feedback from alumni.

The college has a students' council. It is formed as per the guidelines of the State Government and University Act 1994. The Student Welfare Committee selects class representatives on merit basis and forms Students' Council. The students play a very active role in all the college activities. They represent several committees. The student representatives are also appointed on various committees of the college.

The college provides every possible help to the students. It has established the career counselling and guidance cell, which organizes classes for competitive exams. In order to encourage the students for Competitive exams, the cell organizes College Idol exam every year. Our College has a special concern for the health and hygiene of the students. The college regularly conducts Personality Development Programmes with the help of NSS unit.

**CRITERION-VI****GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT**

The college has planned and executed all its academic and administrative reforms in tune with the vision, mission and objectives of K.S.P. Mandal. Management, the Principal and the staff are always stepping together for designing and proper application of the quality policy and plans. - 7) To get recognition of 12 (B) status and apply for different schemes.
- 8) To expand college in multifaculties.

- 1) To bring the rural and economically weak students in the main stream of education.
- 2) To orient for job opportunities to rural students.
- 3) To develop research activities and research consultancy without research centre.
- 4) To establish MoU with other organizations/ Associations.
- 5) To retain the talented students who are opting city based college.
- 6) To increase attendance ratio of the rural students.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

Kisan Shikshan Prasarak Mandal, Udgir established Mahatma Phule Mahavidyalaya, Ahmedpur in the year 2000. Following are the Vision, Mission and Objectives of the Institution.

- To uplift the rural youth with good education
- To serve the students community who are poor, needy, socially, economically and educationally weaker in this region.
- To empower the students morally, culturally and physically.

■ OBJECTIVES:

- To provide education to the masses and educationally backward communities.
- To make the students disciplined and punctual citizens of the Country.
- To make the students knowledgeable, cultural and responsible citizens of the Country.
- To promote education for women and accelerate the movement of women empowerment. To provide educational training to face various challenges in the competitive world. To make the students efficient and self-reliant.
- To impart quality education and to imbibe the spirit of nationalism and patriotism.

The vision and mission are highlighted on the website. They are also displayed at the entrance of college building. In addition to this, the same are communicated to the students and stakeholders through Principal's address on various functions and meetings.

1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

The college is affiliated to Swami Ramanand Teerth Marathwada University, Nanded. The curriculum is designed by the university and is made available to the college for implementation. At the beginning of the academic year, the Principal calls the meeting of staff members for effective implementation of the academic calendar. In this meeting, he motivates the teachers for good beginning. He also asks them to upgrade their teaching methods by using innovative methods in the class. The timetable committee frames timetable. Daily Teaching Diaries (DTD) and Attendance Register are given to all the faculties. Besides, the class tests are conducted by the college. Apart



from regular and traditional teaching methods, faculties impart the curriculum through innovative teaching methods such as assignments, group discussion and seminars, etc.

1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

Appropriate support and encouragement is extended to the members of the faculty for participation in orientation/ refresh courses, seminars, conferences and workshops. The University conducts workshops for teachers whenever there is upgrade/change in syllabus. The college sanctions Duty Leave for attending such workshops and skill upgrading courses. The teachers go through the syllabus and design the action plan of curriculum. The college provides books, journals and relevant study material to faculty to ensure effective implementation of curriculum.

1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The university designs the curriculum. The college relies upon the globally trusted and followed teaching strategy i.e. classroom teaching method. The faculties of our college informally meet the members of Board of Studies and discuss with them about the changes in the curriculum and examination patterns of the concerned subjects. The college faculties use the modern technological resources like internet, LCD projector, etc. Faculties prepare annual teaching plan and maintain Daily Teaching Diaries (DTD). In addition to the regular subject classes, the college also organizes guest lectures on various occasions, seminars, group-discussion and study-tours, to augment classroom teaching. These are some of the initiatives taken up by the college towards effective delivery of the curriculum.

1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The affiliating university designs curriculum and provides it to the college. The college implements it. The teachers are encouraged to attend workshops and seminars in order to keep them well-informed of the recent development in their respective subjects. The college regularly networks and interacts with beneficiaries and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum. The faculty members of the college keep regularly in touch with their counter parts of the affiliating university and get latest information regarding their own respective subjects. Similarly, the various departments of the college arrange the subject seminars, group discussion, etc. in which all students participate and try to comprehend the topic. The Principal regularly conducts formal and informal meetings with the faculties during the academic session, which motivates the faculties.

The University frames the curriculum. The college does not have freedom to design the syllabus or curriculum. Principal Dr. Vasant Biradar is a BoS member of Marathi, SRTM University, Nanded. Asst.prof Dr.P.B.Biradar, of Sanskrit was also a BoS member. Our other faculties also participate in the discussions related to the curriculum design. Whenever they find that the syllabus needs to be modified they communicate their ideas to their respective members of Board of Studies. Faculty members contribute in paper setting, assessment and moderation process of the university. The university conducts seminars at the time of introducing new syllabus and faculty members make necessary suggestions in the proposed syllabus.

The college does not enjoy the freedom to frame its own curriculum for any of the academic programme, as per university act.

Once the academic session is in full swing, all the laid action plans are being followed by conducting unit tests, by giving assignments, etc. Apart from these the college also ensures that during the course of implementation, the stated objectives of the curriculum are achieved.

1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

The college has to follow the framed syllabus of the parent university. A few of our faculties are working in BoS and contributing to frame the syllabus. They give suggestions to the Board of Studies about curriculum as well as frame the syllabus. Our other faculties also participate in the discussions related to the curriculum design in the workshop. They express their views and ideas which are related to institution's goals and objectives. Whenever they find that the syllabus needs to be modified they communicate their ideas to their respective members of Board of Studies.

1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to modify, enrich and organize the curriculum to explicitly reflect the experiences of the students and cater to needs of the dynamic employment market?

The parent university designs the curriculum and the college is bound to follow and implement the same. The faculty members who are working on Boards of Studies and others who are direct in touch with other members of curriculum designing panel, share the inputs of the students with concerned authority to deal with the needs of the student's dynamic employment market. Through our Career and Counseling Cell, we organize the speeches of the various successful officers and eminent personalities from the various departments. The departments arrange educational, industrial, historical, geographical study tours.

1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?



The college has co-education system and the girls students participating in NSS camps and other activities to work together. Environmental science is a compulsory paper at III year level, additionally many students write projects on environmental issues. The college has taken greater efforts for developing and maintaining green and plastic free campus. The department of Geography creates environmental consciousness among the students. NSS unit organizes guest lectures on the human rights, employment opportunities etc. Blood donation camp and rallies to save woman child, tree plantation, relief fund, sadbhavana rally, aids awareness rally etc. are organized by NSS department. NSS department also organizes special camp on Environment and Natural Resources Conservation.

1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

We do not have any value added courses. However, we have many enrichment programmes which are regularly organized to develop different skills of the students along with the course work. NSS Unit engages the students in community development activities which motivate the students to take up the courses of social services.

●Moral and Ethical Values

The college NSS unit visits surrounding areas and villages where awareness on various social, moral, ethical principles and way of life is imparted. The students are also motivated by way of special lecturers so as to instill moral and ethical values in them. The great leaders such as Chatrapati Shivaji Maharaj, Rajmata Jijamata, Mahatma Phule, Dr. B.R. Ambedkar, Mahatma Gandhi, Savitribai Phule, Late Bapusaheb Patil Ekambekar etc. birth anniversaries are celebrated along with a talk on the personality. Awareness and spread of Gandhian thoughts is done through a Jalgaon based Gandhi Research Foundation by promoting the students to read the books on Gandhiji and appear for the exams on Gandhi Vichar Sanskar Pariksha every year during September-October.

●Employable and life skills

The college is aware that the need of communication skill is vital for the students for better career options. Therefore, institution arranges group discussion, essay-writing competitions, hand writing workshops. College organizes college level Debate competition on the occasion of Annual Gathering. Such competitions help the students to improve stage courage.

●Better career options

We have Career guidance cell.

●Community orientation

As far as community orientation is concerned, NSS unit in the college that helps to inculcate the spirit of civic values among the students. Students are also sensitized to various national problems and they are given training to serve society with a human touch. NSS candidates organized voter awareness rally during election period. The college organizes various social welfare programmes like blood donation camp, awareness regarding use of toilets by digging soak pits for the villagers and



cleanliness drive in the village through NSS Unit. NSS candidates participated in state level 'AWAHAN CAMP', 'VIVEKVAHINI CAMP' etc.

1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The college has feedback mechanism to collect responses on curriculum from the stakeholders. The college organizes their meet in order to obtain their valuable suggestions. On the basis of the suggestions from all these stake holders, the College suggests changes or modification in curriculum through BoS members and through faculties attending various workshops on syllabus.

The college is very meticulous regarding any enrichment programme. It is the outcome of a thoughtful interaction with the authorities. The institution monitors and evaluates the quality of its enrichment programmes through constitution of various committees for improvement in the teaching methods, completion of the course and various development initiatives to be taken. The Management visits and keeps a check on the happenings of the college. Most of the times, they are a part of the event. The Principal makes it mandatory for the staff to keep them informed regarding all the activities taking place on the college campus and beyond the campus.

The code of conduct of the faculty, the dress code of the faculty and students, the recitation of the National Anthem and National Song throughout the teachings days, the departmental functions, the regular classes with a number of activities surely radiate positive energy to the students. An advisory committee meets with the higher authority like Principal and the managing Committee from time to time and amends the enrichment programmes to meet the desired objectives. The implementation happens through curricular and extracurricular activities of the college.

The Management, the Principal and the faculty are quite vigilant in the case of quality enrichment. A student satisfaction feedback is conducted in which the student responses are obtained and result is analysed and used for evaluation.

The college is affiliated to Parent University, therefore there is no scope for framing institution's curriculum on its own. We have to follow University syllabus. Faculty members attend Workshops on new syllabi arranged by university and other institutions regarding design and development of curriculum and share their views. This helps in catering the needs of students.

The admissions are being given on first come first serve basis. We do not take extra fees for admission. The college displays the schedule of admission on website, notice-board and the admission process is done according to guidelines given by the parent university, hence admission process is totally transparent.

■SC/ST/OBC& Other category



The college gives preference to sports students in admission and encourages them.

2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

Although the share of differently-abled students is very negligible, college has provided special treatment to them and all necessary measures are taken for differently-abled students. Regarding differently-abled students the college strictly follows educational policies of Maharashtra



Government & UGC. The college maintains an open door policy for the needs of differently abled students. Extra time in the terminal and final Examination are given to such students. Front seating arrangements are made in the classroom for them. Easy accessibility of books is given in library. Set of books from Library are made available for these disable students. Writer provision for differently abled student is given as per university directives. The college provides ramp facility for them.

2.2.2 Does the institution assess the student's needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes. The subject teachers assess the knowledge and skills of the students through interaction and discussion with them. The faculty members interact with the students about their hobbies, interests and motivate the students to participate in various extracurricular activities of their interests.

2.2.3. What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/Add-on/ Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Through classroom interaction and discussion with students, the teacher identifies slow learners initially. Such students are also identified on the basis of marks obtained in the internal unit examination. Meritorious students are asked to help the slow learners. To bridge the knowledge gap, the teachers make the students to revise and recall their knowledge gained in previous classes. Teacher guides the slow learners in different ways in the free time.

2.2.4. How does the college sensitize its staff & students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

The college sensitizes its staff and students on issues like gender, inclusion, environment etc. The college organizes various programmes for the awareness of gender, inclusion and environment. Majority number of girl students are representative of students' council. They lead in sports, cultural, NSS, etc. The college offers the environmental studies as a compulsory subject for third year students. Special awareness is made through guest lectures and wallpaper activities.

2.2.5. How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

The teachers during their lectures in class room get feedback from the students. The faculties conduct various methods of evaluation like signaled answers, vocal responses and written test after each unit of syllabus. Based on their performance students are identified as slow and advanced learners. The teachers take extra hard work in helping them. Further advanced learners are motivated for competitive exams like U.P.S.C., M.P.S.C., banking sector, revenue. The college organizes extra classes for students and teachers spend extra time for them after college hours.

2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?



After declaration of results by the University, results of every class and all subjects are analyzed. The student who is failed in examination is advised to apply for supplementary examination. Counseling is done by the senior teachers. The college gives the facility to borrow the necessary books from the library. In order to minimize the dropout rate, every care is taken so that he or she should not be thrown out of the stream. Financially weak students are helped by the college by allowing fees to be paid in installments and sometimes waiving off fees completely in genuine cases. **2.3 Teaching-learning process**

2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize to teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic Calendar, Teaching Plan, Evaluation, Blue Print etc.)

The Principal conducts meeting at the beginning of the academic year. Various points are discussed including academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print etc.

A) Academic calendar-

Parent University provides academic calendar. It is the road map of the teaching learning and evaluation and other activities. The blue print of the academic planning is given to the student at the beginning of the academic year and faculty members explain the academic planning to the students. The Principal monitors the implementation of teaching schedule. The faculties maintain daily teacher's diaries as per the academic calendar.

B) Teaching plan-

Time table and Annual teaching plan are prepared by teachers at the beginning of academic year. It is micro-planning of teaching learning activity. Teaching plan is prepared according to the academic calendar. The teaching plan is approved by Principal. The Principal verifies the process, if necessary, corrective measures are taken. The teaching-learning activity is planned and organized through 'academic calendar' and 'annual teaching plan'. Time table of the college is displayed on the notice board.

C) Evaluation-

We follow the evaluation pattern prescribed by the Parent University. Apart from this, the college conducts unit tests assignment, oral test, terminal exams, etc. The Principal arranges meetings to coordinate evaluation process. Evaluation is done by college teachers. The university conducts examinations at the end of each semester.

2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching-learning process?

Internal Quality Assurance Cell is established in the college for the enhancement of quality. The IQAC gives feedback as well as recommendations for the improvements in teaching learning process. The IQAC sets the standards and bench marks quantitatively and qualitatively for the college. The IQAC prepares action plan in the beginning of the academic year towards quality enhancement and monitor its effective implementation. The IQAC monitors on the teaching learning process and suggest measures to achieve the set goals and targets. The IQAC tries to find out shortcoming and suggest remedies to overcome the shortcomings identified through feedback. The



IQAC conducts regular meetings and gives feedback as well as recommendations for the improvement in teaching learning process. The feedback is shared with the staff and accordingly changes are made. The IQAC motivates faculty and students to learn emerging technologies and make use of ICT facility available in the college. The IQAC takes assistance of the alumni association for the effective implementation of the curricular and extra-curricular activities.

2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skill like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

To make learning interesting for students, the college provides the learning facilities and supports the learning with various complementary learning experiences. Departments organize inaugural functions of literary and social sciences associations for student's involvement. The students are given exposure for creative writing through wallpaper. Departments conduct special lectures for the enrichment of students. The college provides well-stocked library with reading-room facility. Educational tours, visits to industry, historical places and geographical place. The co-curricular activities such as seminar, debates and elocution are arranged. The extracurricular activities such as cultural, sports, N.S.S. and other extension activities are undertaken by the college to develop participatory learning. All the activities are student-centric.

2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them in to life-long learners and innovators?

The college takes the efforts to nurture critical thinking and creativity and in developing scientific temper among the students through providing various opportunities. The college organizes programs like developing scientific temper, conducts essay writing, quiz, elocution, wallpaper, guest lectures, seminars, and extension lectures are conducted on various topics. The college and N.S.S. department



motivate students to participate in various programs such as, literacy mission, blood donation, pollution control, tree plantation, female feticide, blind faith eradication, etc.

2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective Teaching? Example: Virtual laboratories, e-learning–resources from National programme on Technology Enhanced learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.

The use of modern multimedia teaching aids like LCD projector, internet, and laptop are usually deployed in classroom. The teachers and students use mobiles as educational tools with Wi-Fi connectivity.

2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

For advanced exposure to knowledge and skill, faculty and students are motivated to participate and contribute in seminars, conference, workshops. The college provides blended learning facilities to students. Faculty members attend seminars, conferences, workshops, refreshers, orientation course and present their research papers. The college library provides books, magazines, journals and leading newspapers to students and faculty members to develop their knowledge and skills. The important paper cuttings and articles and information regarding career opportunities are displayed on the notice-board for students.

2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students/benefited) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advice) provided to students?

The college provides academic, financial, social and mental support to the students. The faculty members of the college at the time of admission guide and help the students regarding choice of subjects. The guest lecturers are organized to provide academic support and guidance to the students. The college has established the career counseling and guidance cell for the professional and career development of the student. Students are encouraged to read newspapers, journals as well as reference books. The management gives financial support to economically weak and meritorious students.

2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faculty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

Kisan Shikshan Prasarak Mandal is brand name itself for the quality education. Mahatma Phule Mahavidyalaya of this Mandal also created its own identity for quality education within the little span of time. All teaching faculties of the college are well qualified, aware of ICT and familiar with innovative teaching aids. Therefore, teachers adopt innovative teaching approaches and methods for their effective teaching. They are encouraged to use computers, internet and library resources to



enrich their teaching. The faculty takes efforts to prepare PPT and presents in the classroom which is more effective than the traditional teaching methods. The teachers participate in refresher courses, orientation courses, regional, state, national & international level seminars, workshops to update their knowledge and share their experiences with students and use recent methods/ techniques for teaching.

2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching–learning process?

College is very well aware of the importance and crucial role of library to develop and sharpen the teaching-learning process. Therefore, college has given special emphasis on qualitative as well as quantitative development of library. Special attention is provided to keep the library resourceful and updated to meet the requirements of teachers and students so as to strengthen the teaching-learning process. The college library plays vital role to support teaching learning process. Library has good number of reference books, textbooks of the different subject. It regularly provides reference books and additionally recommended books for students and staff. This helps the faculties to keep themselves updated and generate teaching material based on books of high standards. The library has a large number of books which are required for appearing in competitive exams and personality development. Old question papers of exams and copies of syllabi of all the subjects are made available to the students.

2.3.10 Does the institution face any challenges in completing the curriculum within the planned time frame and calendar? If 'yes', elaborate on the challenges encountered and the institutional approaches to overcome these.

The college prepares an academic calendar for each academic session and completes its curriculum within the stipulated time despite the challenges, like delay in the declaration of results by the parent university, frequent rescheduling of the exam time-table by the university for different reasons. When the staff is deputed to attend orientation or refreshers course, it hampers regularity of classes. However, for timely completion of curriculum the college ensures that faculty engages extra-classes, practical and personal guidance.

2.3.11 How does the institute monitor and evaluate the quality of teaching learning.

The teaching-learning process is monitored and evaluated by the Principal. Faculty members prepare annual teaching diary in the beginning of the academic year. College provides DTD (Daily Teaching Diaries) to each faculty member, which is made mandatory to maintain. The analysis of DTD is monitored by the Principal regularly and suggests improvements. Faculty members attempt to evaluate the students by using interactive teaching and discussion. College provides suggestion box for stakeholders. Principal regularly interacts with the students to discuss the problems while learning. Principal suggests further improvements to the faculty members on the views coming from students and stakeholders regarding faculty members, college, etc.



2.4 Teacher Quality

2.4.1 Provide the following details and elaborate on the strategies adopted by the college in planning and management (recruitment and retention) of its human resource (qualified and competent teachers) to meet the changing requirements of the curriculum

The college follows the rules and regulations of UGC, State Govt. of Maharashtra and Parent University for recruitment.

The institute takes permission from Joint Director of higher education and then from the university with reservation criteria. Advertisement is given in national / state level news papers. After getting applications in response to advertisement the eligible candidates are scrutinized. The college applies to the affiliating University for a panel of expert to conduct the interview. Call letters are issued to qualified candidates for interview by Registered A.D./speed post. Selection panel conducts the interview as per the guidelines issued by the SRTMU, Nanded, selects the eligible and most competent candidates. After giving them the appointment letters, the approval is given by the university.

The Principal sanctions duty leave to staff for attending seminars, conferences and workshops. The Management and Principal encourage staff members to achieve higher degrees in the field of education to upgrade them.

2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes, the college has feedback mechanism. At the end of every academic year college collects feedback forms from students. These are used to assess the individual teacher in terms of their teaching methods, approaches and other such parameters. Principal counsels the teachers. The IQAC takes informal feedback from the students and their parents. The college has CCTV facility using which the Principal can monitor smooth functioning according to the timetable.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms**2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?**

The college makes attempts to care that all the Stakeholders are informed about evaluation process. Changes in syllabus and examination patterns are discussed with staff. Faculties are encouraged to attend syllabus related workshops. At the beginning of the academic year students are made aware of the syllabus and the examination pattern. Management is also very keen about examination results. The results are discussed in the meeting.

2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The entire examination system is followed by the guidelines of the parent University. An Examination Committee is formed in the beginning of the academic year which takes care of all the examination Schedule of the university and the college. Recently the University has brought major



reforms in the examination pattern and evaluation. These reforms are sincerely implemented by the college. These are as follows:

- i) Semester system with internal evaluation component having class test and tutorials.
- ii) Project work system based on research and Viva-voce.
- iii) Multiple Choice Question (M.C.Q.) pattern has been introduced from academic year 2011 which provides 40 marks for Social Sciences and 30 marks for compulsory and second languages respectively. 10 and 20 marks are for Internal Assessment and 40% of aggregate passing criterion is a must for university as well as Internal component taken together.
- iv) So far as Internal Exams (College Level Exams) are concerned, two tests of 30 marks each are conducted which are converted into 20 marks or 10 marks as the case may be.
- v) Recently from 2014-15 the affiliating university has introduced new exam reforms by introducing Theory, MCQ and Internal Evaluation pattern with a marking scheme of 30+10+10 for UG

2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The evaluation reforms of the parent university are followed by the college. The college strictly adheres to the guidelines of the parent university for conducting internal assessment examinations. University examinations in the college are conducted with utmost care and sincerity.

2.5.4 Provide details on the formative and summative evaluation approaches adopted to measure student achievement. Cite a few examples which have positively impacted the system.

Formative assessment

The college follows the evaluation reforms of the parent university. Formative assessment of the student is done through assignment, group discussion, viva-voce, presentations, practical, unit test and class interactions.

Summative assessment

Most of the summative evaluation is done viewing and adhering to the evaluation system of the university. The goal of the summative assessment is to evaluate students learning at the end of session /semester. For the summative approach common tests are conducted in the college. From these tests the students get clear idea to improve their performance for final examination.

These are the formative and summative evaluation approaches in the college. These evaluation approaches proved positive impact on the enrichment of the students.

2.5.5. Details on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skill etc.)

Complete transparency is maintained in the internal assessment. The internal assessment is done as per the guidelines of the university. After preparing the assessment report, it is submitted by the



subject teacher to the Examination Cell of the College. In such case, necessary corrections are made and the revised result is communicated to the student.

In spite of all the above aspects the students' behavioral aspect, independent learning and communication skills and other hidden talents etc. are also taken into consideration during the assessment of students.

2.5.6 What are the graduates attributes specified by the college/ affiliating university? How does the college ensure the attainment of these by the students?

In line with the university graduate attributes, the college works in the direction of developing Self-confidence, self-reliance, ethical values, sense of nationalism, humanity, gender equality, environmental issues, honesty, team work skills, problem solving skills and social responsibilities, etc. are some of the graduate attributes specified by the college. For the attainment of the graduate attributes, the college takes all the possible attempts. The academic calendar is strictly followed. All the teachers make use of ICT to make the complex concepts simple and to create interest about the subject in the students.

Student's seminars and group discussions are also arranged. The college encourages the students to participate in these events. The teachers always try to improve the results and enhance the intellectual level of the students. The syllabus is completed in time and revision is taken.

Besides the regular studies, the college organizes various activities through NSS unit, sport department, students welfare department, study and editorial board, career counseling and guidance cell, etc. which help for overall development of the students. Study tours, visits are also arranged. The students are encouraged to participate in the youth festival organized by the university. All this helps to attain the graduate attributes among the students.



■Sports:

The ideal of a good and perfect life is to have a sound mind in a sound body. Sports play a crucial role to make up a young athlete. The Sports Unit is one of the strongholds of the college. It has a bright track record of excellence in sport events at various levels. The college has spacious play grounds, adequate facilities for indoor and outdoor games. A full time Sports Director looks after the affairs of this department and provides coaching. College provides track-suit and Blazers to participants of Ashwamedh/Inter-Uni./All-India- University players. The sports department has storage shelves for the equipment. The damaged and faulty items are replaced with new material. The department is also equipped to provide First-Aid Kits, equipment and necessary accessories are purchased by the college for students under the guidance of the Sports Director.

■Indoor games:

Facilities for the indoor games like, chess, power lifting, bodybuilding, fencing, etc. are provided to the students in the college campus.

■Outdoor games:

A spacious play ground is available for outdoor games i.e.Kabaddi, Kho-Kho, Athletics, Ball Badminton, Net Ball and Hand Ball in college campus.

■N.S.S:

The college is participating in the youth festival. The students have been participating in all academic, theatrical and musical events. The college also organizes the annual gathering where students' hidden talent is exposed through various events and they are motivated for further success.

■Public speaking communication and skill development:

Personality development programmes are organized by the college which involves various activities like public speaking and communication development, etc. for raising their self-esteem and confidence building. Besides, the college faculties keep on enriching, the students with communication skills under Career Orientation Programme for their personality development with the help of NSS unit and other departments.

■Yoga:

NSS unit arranges Yoga programme for students in special camp. Yoga Day is celebrated in our college.

■Health and hygiene:

The college has a very special concern for the health and hygiene of the college students and staff members. In addition to above mentioned activities; NSS unit arranges free medical check-up camp for teachers and students in special camp.



● Internal Organizational Structure



6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following.

■Teaching & Learning

The college has adopted a feedback method for monitoring, evaluating and improving teaching learning process. For effective teaching and learning process, the college provides necessary infrastructure. The faculty members are encouraged for blended teaching. Daily Teaching Diaries and Annual Planning of the syllabus are compulsory for all teachers. At the end of the academic year, the teachers submit their self-appraisals. The Principal evaluates teaching-learning process. He also motivates the teacher to upgrade and update the knowledge by attending training programmes.



■Research & Development

The college supports the faculty members to undertake research and development activities. They are encouraged to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops. They are motivated to publish research papers in reputed journals. Duty Leave is provided to the faculty members to attend and present research papers in conferences and seminars. The faculties are also motivated to pursue research leading M. Phil., Ph. D. We have 08 Ph.D. holders and 06 M. Phil holders in respective subjects, while 06 faculties are pursuing Ph.D. The college contributes significantly to academic development with its faculty publishing 05 books, 37 papers in international journals and 06 papers in national journals, 02 papers are presented in international level seminars, 41 papers are presented in national level seminars, 11 papers are presented in state level seminars, 08 book chapters during last 4 years. Three faculties are recognized as research guides. The college provides the library facility with journals, books, reference books, dictionaries and encyclopedias. Researchers use these facilities to carry out their research work.

■Community engagement

The institution offers programmes for community engagement through NSS. The volunteers of N.S.S. organize rallies, talks and cultural programmes for community development. Teachers and students are encouraged to participate in the community related activities through NSS. The faculties of departments are given an opportunity to deliver talks on various topics like- Tree Plantation, Hygiene and Sanitation, National Integrity, AIDS Awareness, Water Management etc. The college through NSS unit organizes free medical checkup camp and blood donation camps in the special camp.

■Human resource management

The Management recruits highly qualified and experienced teaching staff. Recruitment of permanent staff is being done as per rules of Government of Maharashtra and parent University. The faculty members are encouraged to attend various staff development programmes. The management encourages faculties to undertake research activities. The college supports the faculty members to undertake research and development activities. They are inspired to participate in seminars, conferences, workshops. They are motivated to publish research papers in reputed journals. Duty Leave is provided to the faculty members to attend and present research papers in conferences and seminars.

■Industry Interaction

In order to interact with industry, our college arranges study tours and visits to various industries like sugar factory, Bank and LIC office.

The Management and Principal are always in contact with each other. The Principal works in co-ordination with the Management and provides them with necessary information about the working of

ICT facilities are provided facilities in order to make them acquainted with new modern methods of teaching. In order to promote research culture, the college encourages to pursue research work like M. Phil. and Ph.D. degree.

The college provides certain facilities to administrative office for the professional development of non teaching staff. The non-teaching staff attends training and workshops organized by Joint Director office, university and other colleges.

The strategies adopted by the college for faculty empowerment are –

- The Principal sanctions Duty Leave as per the Govt. and University rules and regulations to participate in empowerment activities.
- The CAS benefits are availed by each employee who is eligible for it.
- At the college level, the college motivates faculty members through prompt appreciation of exceptional merit, talent and devotion by honoring them in the annual gathering.

It is obligatory for all the teaching faculties to assess themselves through the self-appraisal forms filled at the end of every academic year. The Principal evaluates and suggests necessary improvements for enhancing effectiveness of teacher's performance. The performance of the faculty is also informally evaluated through feedbacks from the other stakeholders.

The Principal of the college takes review of overall requirements of college and presents the budget proposal in Management Council. The committee approves the budgetary provisions. The college purchases as per recommendations of Management. The college maintains the transparent record of financial transactions. The cashbook, the ledger and the vouchers file are maintained regularly. The audit of the expenditure is done regularly through the authorized Chartered Accountant. The annual budget is prepared and submitted for approval to the top management.

Financial recourses which are utilized and monitored by the Accountant as per the rules and regulations. Our office conducts internal audit at its own level whereas all the major accounts are audited by the Chartered Accountant and also audited by the accountant of the Joint Director Office, Higher Education Department of Maharashtra and the Auditor General of Government of Maharashtra conducts the audit after every ten year.

The last audit was done on 31-03-2015 by Mr. Suryakant Gandewar & Company, Chartered Accountants, Nanded during which no objection was raised.

Students, teachers and non-teaching staff contribute to make the scheme successful as social duty. With the help of survey our college selected a village to adopt and communicated with the senior citizens of village.

Practice

The college students works for the welfare and development of the village. They participate in the various activities and programmes in adopted village Ugilewadi.

The following activities performed in the village

- Village Cleanliness: The college students, staff and the villagers made clean the bank of the dam.
- Tree Plantation: With the help villagers college students planted the plants and saplings in the village.
- Women Empowerment: College arranged the rally for women empowerment.
- Water Harvesting and Water Management: NSS unit and college repaired small reservoir in adopted village.
- Agro Guidance Camp: College with the help of NSS unit arranged a lecture on various government schemes.
- Utility and Sanitation: College with the help of NSS unit created awareness of utility and sanitation among the villagers.
- Awareness of the Villagers: College faculty delivered speeches for the awareness of the villagers.
- Village Survey: Students of the college completed the survey of the adopted village.
- Medical Checkup Camp: College with the help of NSS unit arranged free medical checkup camp.

Best Practice-II

●Free Sports Training to the Schoolchildren specially for Fencing

The games and various sports play important role in order to make healthy human being, viewing the importance of health and games in life, the college has adopted the practice of training the children from the various schools. College has spacious play grounds. The college keeps these play grounds open for all. The college also adopts some good school children from the various schools in the town and nearby villages to provide them the training and facilities especially for Fencing so that their interest and skills are developed at an early stage. There is provision of 5% sports quota for MPSC, University, UPSC and other govt. services and admission for various courses.

Later on, when these students get admission in the college and consequently contribute to the success of the sports department as well as college. As the result of this, Mahatma Phule Mahavidyalaya, Ahmedpur is well known for its sports department and sports activities. Our college has won so many titles, competitions and championships in various tournaments.

Our college introduced new game Fencing at college level and university level, our director of sports is national player of Fencing. He is also Director of Maharashtra Fencing Association and Secretary of Latur Dist. Fencing Association. Sports Department trains the school children to popularize the game among the rural students.

1)The Goal:

- To train the school children of the town and nearby villages.
- To prepare sports-persons for the future.
- To create healthy generation.
- To provide future opportunities of service.

2)The Context:

Ahmedpur is located in the rural area. There is lack of the necessary sports infrastructure and expertise. As a result, many capable students cannot get introduced to sports in a proper way. The college has both the infrastructure and expertise to impart sports training to the school-children, which can create an interest about sports in their minds and help them develop into good sportspersons in the future.

College has taken initiation to start this new game at college and University level. Principal and faculties constantly persuaded the parent university to approve this game. As result university included and approved this game for Inter College Tournaments and Inter University Tournament from 2010. Players are practicing this game in college campus daily.

3)The Practice:

The college decided to contact the schools in the vicinity for sending their students regularly to the college grounds, so that they could watch the senior players engaged in games. This helped to create a desire in the children to take part in these games. The children were then selected on the basis of



their likings, preferences and were given proper training in the games of their choice. Mainly Fencing was chosen for training, as the college has strong teams for these sports. Every year school children are provided training by the college Sport Director and the senior players of department. The college also invites an eminent sportsperson to coach the fencers. Schoolchildren are also benefitted by these coaching sessions.

4) Evidence of Success:

As a result of Free Sports Training to the Schoolchildren especially for Fencing, two fencers played at the International level, 10 fencers played at National level and 35 fencers played at state level and achieved medals and many fencers participated at various levels.

Many schoolchildren have been trained on the college grounds during their school years. These students have represented in the junior teams at the school level and have later represented at the inter-college, inter-university and further levels.

The college has good team of fencing now. This is the outcome of this best practice. Majority of the fencers of present team benefitted through this best practice. The college has been able to win several championships with the participation from these players whose training was started in their school years.

Benefitted students:

- Our college conducted first Fencing inter collegiate level tournament in college campus.
- In Inter College Tournaments our college fencing team and fencers stood 1st or 2nd.
- Our college students participated Inter University Tournament, Krida Mahotsav university level and Association Level.
- Our students awarded with rank in Krida Mahotsav for SRTM University Nanded.

There have been no notable problems for implementing this scheme. The college sports material and grounds have been utilized for this program.




